





Jamaica's 60th Independence Diamond Jubilee comes to West Henrietta Baptist Church

Jamaica celebrates its Independence on August 6th, and if August 6th falls on a Sunday, Independence Day is observed as a public holiday on Monday August 7th. This year Jamaica celebrates its 60th Independence

Diamond Jubilee. To commemorate 60 years of independence, Jamaica has launched a series of celebrations on the island and in the diaspora, under the theme 'Reigniting a Nation for Greatness'. In Jamaica, people are taking part in huge street parades and cultural displays. The overall event is termed "Jamaica Festival".

Jamaicans throughout the United States, including in the Washington DC Metropolitan Area, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Georgia, Florida, California, Seattle, Illinois and New York, are set to celebrate "Jamaica 60" with a range of activities over several days.

Over in New Jersey, the Jamaica Organization of New Jersey will stage its Independence Gala on Saturday (July 30) at the Pines Manor in Edison, commencing at 7:00PM. Jamaicans in Florida will commemorate Jamaica's 60th anniversary of independence with an Ecumenical Service of Thanksgiving hosted by the Jamaica Consulate-General in Miami, at the Faith Center at 95th Street in Sunrise Florida on Sunday (July 31) beginning at 4pm. On this day the Embassy of Jamaica will host a Service of Thanksgiving at the Sligo Seventh Day Adventist Church in Takoma Park, Maryland at 11:00AM., to mark the 60th anniversary of Jamaica's Independence. Among the special guests will be members of the diplomatic corps, elected officials, and representatives of international organizations.

In New York, the Jamaica 60 celebrations will begin on Independence Day, Saturday (August 6) with a flag raising ceremony at 10am at the Brooklyn Borough Hall. New York's Governor Kathy Hochul will declare August 6 as Jamaica's annual Flag Day. On Sunday (August 7), the Consulate-General of Jamaica will host its annual Independence Day church service at the Bronx Bethany Church of the Nazarene beginning at 4pm. The sermon will be delivered by the Rev. Richard Griffiths.

The Minister of Culture, Gender, Entertainment and Sport, Olivia Grange, has announced that Jamaica's colors – black, green and gold – will light up Niagara Falls in Canada on August 6.

On Saturday (August 6) at 7:00PM, the Consulate-General in association with Jamaica United Relief Association (JURA) will host Jamaica's Diamond Independence Jubilee Gala at the Marriott Fort Lauderdale, where veteran entertainer Dr Jimmy Cliff, OM, will be honored. The Inner Circle Band will provide entertainment. On Sunday (August 7) beginning at 2:00PM, there will be an official Jamaica Flag Raising Ceremony at Lauderhill Sports Club, Oakland Blvd., in Sunrise, while the Consulate-General will host the Jamaica Independence Motorcade with civic officials of Lauderdale Lakes and Lauderhill City.

It is within this context that the Rochester Jamaican Organization, INC invites you to join them in a special Worship Service at West Henrietta Baptist Church on Sunday, August 7, at 10:00AM to praise God for Jamaica's 60th Independence Diamond Jubilee. The service will follow the regular order with a few greetings and musical presentations. Rev. Dr. Peter E. Grinion will be the preacher. Following worship, we will serve some of Jamaica's finest cooked meals with all worshippers.

Skunk On The Loose

On my desk I have a pencil holder that may look like an ordinary yogurt container.

But there's a story behind it.

It was a rustling in the woods that made me glance out the window beside my computer. At the edge of the trees I caught sight of a skunk, his black-and-white pattern duplicating the dappled light. He seemed to be busy — burrowing, maybe? My knowledge of skunks began and ended with their dreadful odor.

The next moment, though, the animal emerged from beneath the trees and zigzagged across the lawn: plume-like tail, striped back and...where his head should have been, a bizarre-looking yellow helmet. As he came closer I saw what the "helmet" was: a plastic yogurt container.

The carton struck a rock, and the creature whirled in another direction, only to bump up against our picnic table. For a second he stood still, shaking his head frantically. But the yogurt carton was wedged fast. The skunk charged blindly back into the woods.

I stared after him in dismay. How long had he been running in darkness and terror?

It would be the work of a second for me, I thought, to pull that thing off. But the idea of pursuing a skunk through the undergrowth kept me immobilized at the window. How would I ever catch him? And then what? Wouldn't he spray me?

I sat down and tried to pick up the thread of the story due in the mail that afternoon. But I could think only of an animal running till he dropped from exhaustion. Hadn't this sort of thing happened before? Might animal experts know what to do?

I dialed the local SPCA. "We only handle domestic animals," the woman told me. "You want the Department of Wildlife." She gave me a number in New Paltz, New York.

By now the skunk was probably a long way off. Maybe someone else would see him. Someone braver and more athletic.

I dialed the number in New Paltz. A man in

the Department of Wildlife listened to my story, then held a muffled conversation. "If skunks can't see you," he said, "they don't spray."

Well...that sounded all right, as long as the skunk's head was inside the container. "What happens after the carton comes off?" I asked.

"Make sure," the man advised, "that he doesn't feel threatened."

I wondered how one went about reassuring a terrified skunk.

"You could throw a blanket over him," the wildlife man suggested, "then run while he's finding his way out."

"That might work," I said, but I must have sounded as unsure as I felt, because the man asked where I was calling from and began looking up names of conservation officers in my area.

How long would it take, I wondered, for someone to get here? Where would the skunk be by then? I was ripped by a sudden strange urgency. I thanked the man, hung up and ran outside. Without stopping to change out of my next-to-best slacks, and forgetting about the blanket theory, I ran up our driveway to the road.

Of course the skunk wasn't there. Nor did I know why I was. In his frenzy, when I had seen him last, the animal had been heading the opposite way, straight down the hill into the woods. But my feet never slowed. I turned left and dashed down the street as though rushing to a long-ordained appointment. I had run perhaps a hundred yards when a black-and-white streak emerged from the bushes beside the road and ran straight at me, the carton bumping the pavement with each step.

I stooped and grabbed hold of the yogurt carton before the astonishment of finding the skunk hit me. The animal was tugging and twisting, unexpectedly strong, to get away. His front claws scrabbled against the slippery yellow plastic, his body strained backward, and still he could not wrench free of the carton's vise-like neck. It took both of my hands tugging the other way to hold on—until a small black head suddenly popped free.

And there we were, facing each other, two feet apart. I don't know what he saw, and how threatening or not the apparition was, but what I saw was a sharp quivering nose, two small round ears, and alert black eyes that stared straight into mine.

For fully 10 seconds we held each other's gaze. Then the skunk turned, ran a few yards and vanished into a culvert that goes beneath the road. I stood there, looking after him. Three minutes could not have passed since I had hung up the telephone.

But a timeless parable had played itself out, I thought as I headed back down the drive. The skunk was all those needs I hesitate to get involved in: Involvement takes time and I have deadlines to meet. I probably can't do anything anyway. Somebody else can handle it better. Besides, involvement can be ugly, and the stench may rub off on me.

And all these things, of course, may be true. But I've got a yellow pencil-holder on my desk, a rather scratched and battered one, to remind me that every now and then God's answer to a need is me

3-2-1 CAKE

You need two boxes of cake mix. One can be any flavor you prefer, but the other <u>MUST</u> be Angel Food cake mix.

Mix them together (shake them together in a 1 gallon Ziploc bag).

Then simply store the mixture in an airtight container until you get the urge for dessert.

Basic 3-2-1 Cake: put 3 Tbsp of the dry mixture in a big coffee mug and stir in 2 Tbsp of water. Microwave it for 1 minute and you will have a single serving of cake! It will have the texture of a sponge cake.

Top with fruit, ice cream, whipped cream or whatever! Awesome for those of us who want something sweet every now and then without making an entire cake!

Other options to try:

Molton Chocolate/Candy 3-2-1 Cake: Follow the same instructions above but mix the cake mix in a separate container. Add half the batter to the mug and place a chocolate or candy in the center - a Hershey kiss, mini candy bar, or chocolate chips would work great. Pour remaining batter on top and microwave. For double chocolate, use a chocolate cake mix with the angel food cake mix for the batter.

Banana 3-2-1- Cake: Follow the regular directions and add 1/4 cup mashed banana to the batter. No one would blame you for adding 1 tsp. of melted peanut butter on top or mixing in some PB2 either.

Caramel Apple 3-2-1 Cake: Start by microwaving 1/2 chopped apple in a mug until soft. Sprinkle with cinnamon. Add half of the cake batter (vanilla works best) and then one caramel candy in the center. Add remaining batter and microwave. You could also drizzle caramel on top after instead.

Pumpkin Spice 3-2-1 Cake: Add 2 tbsp. canned pumpkin and 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice to your batter for a perfect fall treat.
