LOVE

"They'll Know We Are Christians By Our Love"

If you mention the month of February, most of us immediately think about Valentine's Day, romantic "Love", a significant other, a memory of a departed, loving partner, heart shaped boxes of candy, little red/pink colored cards, etc. This month of February we openly speak the word "love".

But what "LOVE" do we share with each other as Christian "Brothers" and "Sisters"?

John 13:34 states: "And now I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." And "For the whole Law is summed up in one commandment: "Love your neighbor as you love yourself." from Galatians 5:14.

Reading a recently received religious article regarding our use of social media, it extolled the usual admonishments of not opening email messages unless we feel the sender is safe, not posting personal information on social media sites, not revealing news of our upcoming periods of holiday/vacation away from home, etc. The article also mentioned the many benefits of social media posting: staying in contact with geographically dispersed family and friends, sharing with "like minded" people our thoughts; involvement in online communities of various social causes, business networking and marketing; etc. All these warnings and benefits we hear continually.

However, my mind started to wander as I read one line stating that items posted on social media cannot be totally deleted/removed. My mind really took off when I read a couple of words: "risk to reputation". I recognize schools and potential employers utilize applications to scan student and prospective employee social media messaging. I am quite aware employers utilize "apps" scanning company computer systems for employee use of social media and take action when negative/volatile comments are posted.

My wandering mind focused on the article's message as it dealt with our use of social media. My mind took the article's message and started considering how easily our social media postings and re-postings destroy our stated expressions of Christian Love.

How many times do we see a "cutesy" cartoon, rapidly re-posting to our Facebook page, without thought of the impact the cartoon has on those who read our Facebook postings. Most of the time not consciously considering what we just posted is "out there" forever; not considering what we display about ourselves; after all it is just a cute, funny cartoon. That little politically divisive re-posting reaches so much farther than the many times on Sunday morning we state our Christian Love.

Further, what are we saying when the re-posted cartoon pokes fun at, marginalizes, someone who shares a different political view, a different gender, a different age group, a different race? LOVE? I submit, we, yes myself included, so quickly re-post things which is viewed as negative by those who we profess to "love as our neighbors". Does Facebook, YouTube, Twitter, Instagram, Pinterest, etc. represent us, possibly more accurately than we would like to admit?

And how long the hurt lingers when we marginalize each other: a "jesting" statement of "discrimination", of being treated as "stupid", of being told "you don't understand". Imagine the raw emotion burnt when one tries to express a personal point of view and we constantly cut the person off in mid-sentence. Or how "bullied" we feel when another emphatically states "That doesn't mean anything", dismisses us with a "whatever" as they walk away!

Additionally, I am positive we all have heard the admonishment: "when someone gossips to me about someone else, they're probably gossiping about me to someone else!" 1 Corinthians 13:1 reminds us: "I may be able to speak the languages of men and even of angels, but if I have no love, my speech is no more than a noisy gong or a clanging bell."

I believe our forwarding politically divisive, gender slamming, demeaning cartoons easily appears lacking in Christian Love when viewed by our "Facebook Friends". Especially those among us who have already suffered the pains of having been bullied, of being left out, of being subjected to ridicule just because we are perceived as different. Further, the "stacked up" little hurts grow exponentially until just a little statement becomes a final straw of pain.

"God loves us" is our message of Christian Love. God loves us even though we are different. God loves us, accepting who we are, as we are! Yet we may not get that message when our Christian neighbors, brothers and sisters "in Christ", post/re-post those "cute/funny" cartoons on social media threads. Thankfully, as "The Love of God" song boasts: "Could we with ink the ocean fill and were the skies of parchment made. Were every stalk on earth a quill and every man a scribe by trade. To write the love of God above would drain the ocean dry nor could the scroll contain the whole though stretched from sky to sky." "O love of God, how rich and pure! How measureless and strong! It shall forevermore endure".

I pray, Oh God, your love shows through to my "neighbors", my "brothers and sisters", in all of my communication, whether it be verbal, written, or through my social media usage. Please forgive me when it doesn't. Amen!

for us too. These prayers are full of bittersweet moments. Let me tell you about our "another child", and invite you home to see the children crowded around our table.

Another again child comes over with a growling stomach, and whispers to Olivia, "Tell your mom you need a snack". So, I gladly pull out peanuts and toast for my daughter and another child.

Another child quietly colors with Olivia at our table. She proudly hangs her picture on our fridge since she doesn't have one of her own, or even a family that values crayon masterpieces. Next to pictures by my kid is a drawing from *Another*.

Yesterday *Another* child brought over her report card. She needed someone to say "I believe in you. You got this". So, in that holy ordinary moment, *Another* and I grew together through hugs and high fives.

In town, *Another* street boy shows me his scrapes and bumps from another night of roughhousing and living on the edge, hoping for some sympathy and Neosporin. My list of *Another* stories goes on. *Another* healed, *Another* set free, *Another* who knows he is loved. This truth should blow me away, and sometimes it does. Yet, I often miss the magnitude of *Another's* miracle as we wait for a more personal miracle. It's easy to miss God's handiwork as we focus on our perceptions and expectations. Sometimes in our nearsightedness we miss how God daily answers this plea through His creativity.

God's at work. Do we want to watch?

Focusing on our unmet expectations causes painful confusion even when God is shining brightly.

Maybe you can relate. After years of waiting and praying, you are still waiting and praying. Disappointments and unanswered prayers lead to withered dreams. Life can be unfair. God, I see Your hand, but the answer is not what I thought. God, I know you are with me, but I **really** want to walk the easy road. Even in the not-easy, His Spirit leads us to trust.
