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Hope for Uncertain Times



May the peace of God be yours this day.

I believe this year will go down in the annals of history as a very challenging year for all of us. With respect to current problems, our country is faced with issues related to Covid-19 pandemic, climate change, violent crime, racism, sexism, ageism, economic inequality, drug addiction, unemployment, shortage of food among a wide cross section of socio-economic groups, affordability of health care, and children falling behind in school.

How we confront these problems depends on whether or not we keep our focus on the problem rather than the solution – God Himself. The Christian's approach is to see the problems as opportunities to exercise faith, to practice trusting the Lord, to prove God's great faithfulness, and to be proved by Him. Our Christian faith is made stronger when we work together with the Lord to find solutions to life's problems.

If hope was ever a necessary coping mechanism for contemporary Christians, it is presently vitally necessary for both our mental and spiritual health. To live without hope is to cease to live. Someone said, "What oxygen is to the lungs, such is hope to the meaning of life." Hope is the belief that something beneficial is to come, the idea that what is currently seen is not the end of the story, but something greater is ahead. Hope in itself is faith that God does have plans for us and that they are good indeed. In all biblical stories, hope is an integral component of the journey. My major concern has to do with how each one of you will respond or continue to respond to the present condition as outlined above; therefore, I offer the following suggestions:

First, avoid wrong reactions to the problems. Your primary questions always should be, "Am I willing to follow God's will when I know it? Friends, we have an obligation as Christians to be a witness to our faith in a God who loves and cares for all His people. Avoid hatred and malice. Control your anger aimed at others. Paul exhorts us, "... examine everything; hold firmly to that which is good, abstain from every form of evil (1 Thess. 5:21-22).

Second, follow the example of Jesus. During the last 4 years, I led the church through numerous studies of St. Paul's letters and the Gospels, and we looked at different aspects of the hope that Jesus brings to the world today. Like Jesus, be a God -pleaser, not self-pleasers or a people-pleaser. People-pleasers are those who try to please people even if they have to compromise their own conscience to do so. Paul tried to please people as long as pleasing them did not cause him to displease the Lord (Galatians 1:10, 1 Corinthians 10:33). Follow Jesus by loving your neighbors, regardless of race, ethnicity or creed

Third, work to achieve unity, not division. St. Paul pleads that every effort be made for unity with these words: "Let us therefore make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification" (Romans 14:19). Guard this unity by being sensitive to your brothers and sisters in Christ and not offending them unnecessarily (Romans 14:20–15:1). Each of us should 'please our neighbors for their good, to build them up' (Romans 15:2).

Fourth, avoid solving your problems with human efforts alone. God has the power to remove our burdens and rescue us in our distress. His intent is for His children to face their problems in the power of the risen Christ. God says, "I removed the burden from their shoulders ... In your distress you called and I rescued you" (Psalm 81:6a–7a).

Military Plaque Mystery - Part II In July I reported a mystery about Regina Seel on our Military Plaque: when she served, & who was she to our church. Since November is when we honor our veterans, I revisited the questions.

It turns out my research in July was incorrect. Regina Christine was born July 15, 1912 in West Henrietta to George J. & Sophia (Rummus) Schillinger. In 1938 she had 3 years of high school & was working as a Secretary, 341 Exchange St., Rochester. Dec. 31, 1942 she enlisted in the Army Reserve, Women's Army Corps. Her rank is listed as Aviation Cadet; she was 5 ft., 102 lbs.

She married Elmer G. Seel, Jr. July 31, 1940 so the Seels in my last article living at 624 Hillside Ave., Roch. were her in-laws. Elmer enlisted March 7, 1941 in Syracuse & was listed as a Chemist for Kodak. Elmer was born Dec. 12, 1914 in Buffalo, N.Y. In 1943 Elmer & Regina were living at 624 Hillside Ave. in Rochester. They must have divorced as she married Luther F. Remington in 1946, & passed March 24, 1990 at age 77. She is buried with Luther in River View cemetery on East River Road in West Henrietta. Elmer married again Sept. 28, 1946 in West Henrietta.

Luther F. Remington was born April 30, 1910 son of Alvah & Anna Aldrick (Scrymgeour) Remington. Luther enlisted in the Army Jan. 27, 1942 (5' 7" & 137 lbs., single) & died Aug. 4, 1968 at 58 yrs. of age. They had one son, David A. Remington, born 1950 and died accidentally in 1966 in Pittsford, NY; buried in River View.

This raises some questions: why is Regina listed as Seel vs. Remington; her service time? unmarried? The answer to that may be "yes" to both. More research at a later time may give answers. I found interesting information regarding an earlier Dr. Alvah Remington (who served in the Civil War) & his family if anyone is interested. The stained glass window behind the piano honors Alvah Remington. Luther Remington's obituary is a combination of two published in

David & Michelle Heed, Missionaries to Tanzania have been successful in their efforts to get the villages they have been ministering to covered with health insurance to improve their overall


