Greetings to you all in the mighty name of Jesus our Lord and Savior. The New Year has arrived and we should be thankful to be alive. New Year certainly brings lots of excitement, but also challenges, and we cannot forget those of our loved ones who left us last year to be with Jesus.

I extend my wishes that the New Year be filled with faith, hope, love, joy, good health and prosperity. It is in God that we hope. Take my life and let it be consecrated Lord, to Thee, Take my moments and my days; let them flow in ceaseless praise. Take my will, and make it Thine; It shall be no longer mine. Take my heart, it is Thine own; it shall be thy royal throne.

He was a Mason, Shriner, Rotarian and Medicare Supplemental insurance broker.



Donald Hirschman passed away peacefully on December 13, 2017 at his home on East River Road in West Henrietta. He is survived by his loving wife of 52 years, Loretta; sons, Karl (Theresa) and Paul (Michelle); grandchildren, Elizabeth, Rebecca, Ryan, Rhetley, Khylee, Makai and Jaden. He is also survived by his sisters, Dorothy and Irene. He was predeceased by his brothers, Robert and Earl. His cousins and many nieces and nephews also survive him.

Don worked for 24 years as a heavy equipment operator for RG&E. However, at heart he was a farmer all his life. Don grew up at 468 Tremont Street in Rochester, and attended Madison High School. ## Christmas Eve, Candlelight Service



These changes will be voted on at the Annual Meeting, January 21, 2018.

#### **Summary of Proposed Revisions to WHBC Constitution**

- 1. The constitution will require a Procedures Manual that clarifies responsibilities and is easily amended.
- 2. It creates an "inactive list" status for members who have neither attended nor given, without valid excuse, for two years.
- 3. "Exclusion" is based solely on the recommendation of the Deacons and vote of the congregation. "Gross immorality or extended delinquency" have been eliminated as causes for exclusion.
- 4. The language is gender neutral throughout.
- 5. The position of Moderator has been revised to reflect the current role.
- 6. The position of School Superintendent was eliminated.
- 7. The duties of the Board of Christian are more generic with the understanding that specifics will be in the Procedures Manual.
- 8. It clarifies that any Pulpit Committee appointed by the Advisory Council would be responsible for the hiring, supervision, and possible dismissal of an interim.
- 9. The original resolution creating the Memorial Endowment Fund has been removed. The spirit of that resolution remains. Any necessary specifics for its management will be in the Procedures Manual.
- 10. The Pastor's Cabinet is to meet monthly and serve as a pastoral relations body and work with the Pastor on plans to be recommended to the Advisory Council. Responsibility for an annual planning conference has been moved from the Advisory Council to the Cabinet.
- 11. The "Special Fund" has been renamed a "Designated Purpose Fund."
- 12. The boards of Deacons and Christian Education shall have No More Than six members. The Board of Trustees shall have At Least three members.
